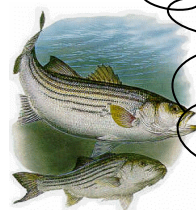

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California Fish and Game Commission rejects striped bass slot limit 3 to 2 due to the threat of legal action and uncertainty regarding predation

SACRAMENTO – After a process lasting nearly 5 years, the California Fish and Game Commission (FGC) rejected the proposed striped bass slot-limit from 18 to 30 inches by a 3 to 2 vote on October 8. Regardless of the outcome, the process taken by the FGC left much to be desired as closing comments from the commissioners lead one to believe that the proposal was doomed from the start. In the meantime, thousands of hours were dedicated to the proposal by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), representatives of the Nor-Cal Guides and Sportsmen's Association (NGASA), and individuals who attended several meetings and provided input throughout the process. The FGC is faced with many difficult and controversial decisions but dragging out this specific proposal for years has left stakeholders feeling unvalued.

A tremendous amount of time, effort, and hope was dedicated to this issue, but after listening closely to the justification of the three commissioners who voted to reject the slot-limit proposal the following reasons were given: the potential for predation on listed species; a specific concern of a lawsuit; and a general misunderstanding of the intent of the proposal. The potential of predation on listed species and the threat of a lawsuit was no secret when this process began, and they were listed as the primary reasons for rejection by the three commissioners. Since these were well known factors, the entire process could have been avoided by not forwarding the proposal during the first hearing.

According to a summary from the CDFW, the initial petition was granted in December 2020, was heard at various of the Commission's Wildlife Resource Committee meetings, a hearing during the June 2025 meeting, a discussion during the August 2025 meeting, and an adoption hearing during the October 2025 meeting. Obviously, the CDFW believed the proposed slot-limit had merit, otherwise the department wouldn't have committed the number of hours of study and presentation involved.

A letter from the petitioning party, NGASA, prior to the commissioners prior to the October 8 meeting included, "Over the past two years, our recreational angling community has been a committed party in discussions with FGC's and the DFW's leadership to present pragmatic solutions to the management of Striped Bass as a game fish. This included finding fiscal and non-fiscal management actions, including funding for the DFW to study, develop and implement a Fisheries Management Plan and/or other alternatives geared toward Striped Bass long term health and viability (conservation). This proposal is one of those alternatives. The regulatory change petition proposed by NCGASA and supported by our organizations offers a low-cost alternative management tool that will promote the conservation of Striped Bass. By restricting take to a specific target size range, younger, sub-adult, Striped Bass females will have an opportunity to reach reproductive maturity and older large adults will be prevented from catch from the SFEW during their most reproductive years. Additionally, NCGASA has committed financial resources to collect real time data on the Striped Bass population to facilitate management decisions based upon defensible science. It is our sincere hope that our recreational angling community can team with DFW to provide credible science on the current status of the Striped Bass to conserve Striped Bass for future generations of anglers."

Since their introduction to California's waters in 1879, striped bass and salmon coexisted in abundance for decades; but both species have been severely affected by increased water diversions out of the Delta. Over the past 50 years, the numbers of large striped bass have decreased significantly, leading experienced anglers like 83-year-old, George Wight of Oakley, one of the last living charter members of the California Striped Bass Association, to state, "I first came to the West Coast in the 1960's, and I have been fishing for striped bass in the Delta since then. In my lifetime, I have seen the demise of both the striped bass and salmon. In the 60's and 70's, there was no shortage of either species, it's hard for people to understand how good fishing used to be. A 30-pound striper was a trophy where a 30-inch striper is now considered a trophy. Even 10 years ago, I would routinely catch and release 15-pound striped bass



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in the shallows on top water plugs or glide baits. This isn't happening now." The intent of the slot limit proposal was to protect the adult striped bass population.

CDFW Director Bonham reviewed three recommendations by CDFW staff from the August 2025 meeting: 1) Would not support lowering the 18-inch minimum size; 2) Support no change in regulations; and 3) Support for a slot-limit for striped bass from 18 to 30 inches. When asked directly whether adoption of this proposal would hurt salmon, Bonham stated, "Striped bass eat salmon. Is it the single most important factor is striped bass predation as there are other important thing causing the decline, no, is it a factor you have to deal with, absolutely." When asked again by Commissioner Anderson, Bonham continued, "I don't think the single top primary limiting factors for salmon population in California is the issue around predation, I think there are others such as land or water management. But you have to acknowledge all factors contributing and what kind of risk dynamic you are engaged in. I think that's a fair point."

The threat of a lawsuit was also central to the rationale for rejection as Commissioner Sklar referred to this twice, summing up his comments stating, "We've been on this for an awfully long time, and it is clear from everything we have heard that we will be sued if we approve this. I don't think that should be primary reason that we should vote for or against something, but it should be weighed as one of the elements."

As has happened several times in the past when there is a controversial topic in front of the Commission, during the October meeting, the over 30 commenters from the public were put on hold for hours while Agenda Item 17 – Department of Water Resources (DWR), was placed ahead of Agenda Item 14 – Striped Bass slot-limit, due to representatives of the DWR stating they were only available from 1 to 3 pm. As a result, after being held hostage waiting to speak since 11:00 am, public comment on Agenda Item 14 started after 3:00 pm and was limited to one minute per speaker. The FGC states that public comment is valued, but this action of being put on hold for hours resulting in extremely limited time has occurred far too

many times in the past to demonstrate once again that actions speak louder than words.

I have advocated for a slot-limit for years, and I was amazed that this proposal was taken to the limit through the numerous meetings prior to the October 8 vote. It seems that during the ensuing years, concerns about predation and threat of legal action could have been addressed by the Commissioners well in advance. To build trust from the public, the FGC must identify early in the process issues that cannot be supported rather than creating a false sense of optimism. Time is valuable, and dragging out the process to drag out a process in the appearance of fair process is a waste of time for all involved stakeholders.

With the failure of the proposed slot limit, we can only hope more anglers practice catch-and-release of large striped bass to preserve this valuable recreational species.

[Restore the Delta Responds to New "Affordable California" Ballot Initiative and Governor's Push to Fast-Track Delta Conveyance Project](#)

Stockton, CA – On Tuesday, October 21, the California Chamber of Commerce filed a request for a ballot [initiative](#) misleadingly titled the "Building an Affordable California" initiative. The proposal seeks to streamline environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for so-called "essential" infrastructure projects, including major water, transportation, housing, and energy developments.

Under the initiative, "essential projects" are defined so broadly that virtually any public, private,



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paving the way for large-scale construction without the environmental review and community protections CEQA provides.

“This is a direct attack on environmental justice communities, Tribal sovereignty, and the ecosystems that sustain our state,” said **Morgen Snyder, Director of Policy and Programs at Restore the Delta**. “At a time when California residents are on the verge of losing their SNAP benefits and healthcare, framing this initiative as ‘affordable’ is frankly disrespectful. While housing affordability is a real crisis, removing community voices and environmental safeguards for the sake of industry profits is a massive step in the wrong direction.”

The proposal follows a growing wave of legislative efforts to weaken CEQA in the name of speeding up large infrastructure and housing projects—despite the fact that many of these recent streamlining measures have not yet been implemented or evaluated. If passed, the new initiative would:

- Eliminate key community and environmental protections, including shortening the timeframe for public comment, which places an undue burden on impacted communities — often with fewer resources — effectively eliminating or severely limiting their ability to provide input and advocate for mitigation of harms.
- Undermine AB 52 Tribal consultation requirements, replacing them with vague, limited language that weakens tribal sovereignty and confidentiality.
- Leave mitigation decisions entirely to the lead agency, giving developers and state departments unchecked authority to define their own environmental accountability.

Notably, the proposed ballot language defines an “essential water project” as one that repairs, replaces, improves, or augments public water systems — or falls under the state’s Water Resilience Portfolio. Under this definition, the controversial Delta Conveyance Project would almost certainly qualify as an “essential project.”

That designation would effectively shield the Delta Tunnel from meaningful CEQA review — silencing Delta communities and ignoring the project’s massive environmental and economic consequences. The Delta region supports a \$780 million recreation and tourism economy, a \$1.5 billion commercial fishing economy, and \$5 billion in agricultural production — all of which could be undermined by the project’s disruption of Delta flows and ecosystems.

The Chamber’s proposal coincides with Governor Gavin Newsom’s [announcement](#) this week celebrating new “wins” for the Delta Conveyance Project, including a court decision allowing preliminary geotechnical work to resume and the Department of Water Resources’ submission of a Certification of Consistency with the Delta Plan.

Restore the Delta cautioned that these developments are not victories for Californians, but rather signals of a deeper pattern of state leadership prioritizing politically connected water agencies over the Delta’s ecological and economic health.

“The Governor’s framing of the Delta Tunnel as a climate solution is profoundly misleading,” **Snyder added**. “It will not create new water, it will only reroute it — deepening harm to Delta communities, Tribal resources, and ecosystems that are already at a breaking point. There will be appeals and debate around whether this project is even consistent with the Delta Reform Act’s co-equal goals: protecting the Delta and ensuring reliable statewide water supplies.”

Restore the Delta calls on California’s elected leaders to reject backroom attempts to gut environmental review and instead focus on truly sustainable, community-driven solutions for water resilience such as investments in regional self-sufficiency, ecosystem restoration, and equitable access to clean water for all Californians.



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West Delta's President's Cup Catch & Release Derby
